INTRODUCTION

In August 2013, Kīpuka o ke Ola, also known as KOKO, was founded. Two Clinical Psychologists (Dr. Claren Kealoha-Beaudet and Dr. Franco Acquaro), along with five Native Hawaiian community leaders (original Board of Directors: Sonny Shimaoka, Bob Lindsey, Jennifer Bryan, Russell Paio, and Wally Lau), embarked on the journey to establish a Native Hawaiian Health Clinic in Waimea on the Big island of Hawai'i. This initiative was born in response to a community needs assessment conducted by the Waimea Hawaiian Homesteaders' Association which called for a health clinic that could specifically address the health disparities endured by Native Hawaiians in North Hawai'i.

In January 2014, the late Earl E. Bakken joined forces with KOKO and helped establish KOKO as a dba under the existing Five Mountains Hawai'i Inc 501c3 non-profit.

From 2014-2016, KOKO grew to include a suite of integrated health services including behavioral health and primary care services.

From 2017-2019, KOKO celebrated the grand opening of its new ADA-compliant facility and became Hawai'i's only Federally Accredited Independent Native Hawaiian Rural Health Clinic! It also expanded services to include Women's Health and patient care coordination/case management services.

In its first six years of operations, KOKO has been honored to have received the endorsements from such notable organizations as the Royal Order of Kamehameha I (Moku o Kohala), Office of Hawaiian Affairs, Waimea Hawaiian Homesteaders' Association, Kailapa Community Association, La'i'opua 2020, County of Hawai'i's Mayor's Office, Nā Kālai Wa'a, Kanu o ka 'Āina Learning 'Ohana, , the Kohala Center, Pelatron Center for Economic Development, and Hui Mālama Ola Nā 'Ōiwi.



Vision Statement:

The Native Hawaiians living in North Hawai'i will enjoy the highest quality comprehensive healthcare from prenatal to end of life.

Mission Statement:

Kīpuka o ke Ola provides cultural, spiritual, medical, and psychological services to all residents of North Hawai'i with a special emphasis for the Kanaka Maoli. This mission is our kuleana.

Kīpuka o ke Ola provides culturally informed direct services, actively collaborates with Hawaiian agencies & associations in order to meet their members' needs and is led by the community it serves.

REFLECTIONS

Developmentally speaking, Five Mountains Hawaii – Kīpuka o ke Ola has done some growing up in the year 2019. We on-boarded approximately 800 new patients, hired much needed new staff, added four new patient rooms, and launched women's health and indigenous health services in honor of our founder Dr. Earl Bakken. However, the reason for our existence is always to benefit the health care needs of our lāhui. So, in speaking to that kuleana, KOKO completed 8800 patient visits in the year 2019. I would like to extend my most humble aloha to all KOKO's patients for entrusting your health to our care. Our founder, Dr. Earl Bakken, envisioned a system of health care that would embrace individual differences by blending health care modalities in a respectful manner that honors the patient's perspective of health. This was the intention when we added women's health, acupuncture, lomilomi massage, and lā'au lapa'au to our service delivery at KOKO. It is our hope that as we gather the various fragrant blossoms and vibrant foliage in the rain forest of Kohala we will have woven (wili) together a tight and vibrant lei haku of keola. I look forward to what this new decade will bring to KOKO and promise to stay grounded in the lāhui of Waimea as we holomua together.

Can you relate to moments when you meet someone for the first time and something in your bones and spirit sends a special type of signal to your brain notifying your conscience that this person has always been your hoaloha? Well, if you can relate to this sentiment then you will understand the unique relationship that I have had the privilege of sharing with Keaulana Holt. If you have the honor of meeting Keaulana you will most likely never forget him. He is a 6'6 Native Hawaiian gentlemen with penetrating soulful green eyes and an intelligent quick wit that leaves your head spinning if you stop paying attention for even a second. When I met Keaulana he was the director of Papa ola Lokahi's Native Hawaiian Health Scholarship program of which I am a grateful benefactor. It was at a conference in LA where we sat together in the bar of the Hotel and shared our personal stories. Keaulana listened with intent as I shared my vision for a Kipuka in Waimea Hawaii that would pay special attention to the ola or health needs of Native Hawaiians on the Big Island. Keaulana's green eye's sparkled with enthusiasm for such a relatable project as he too shared a feeling of kuleana for the health of his own 'ohana and lahui. Keaulana took on the role of Kahu for this project as he pushed, gently nudged and coached me toward a better and clearer understanding of health care systems. I was not a fluid learner but perhaps more of a pakiki (stubborn) Native Hawaiian women who had difficulties with the acceptance of social injustices. Keaulana took the time to teach me that not all injustices will be solved in one project, but with a consistent and unwavering approach we will eventually reach Kahiki (the destination). Under his watchful guidance Five Mountains Hawaii – Kipuka o ke Ola was able to attain the Federal Rural Health Care designation. This designation allows KOKO to turn over the financial constraints of Insurance driven managed health care, to a system that exists for the betterment of the disenfranchised members of the community. One small step toward social justice. Keaulana has played an integral role in the existence of Five Mountains Hawaii – Kipuka o ke Ola, so with every ounce of my aloha Keaulana, I remain in deep gratitude to you in perpetuity. Mahalo piha my hoaloha, aloha wau ia oe.

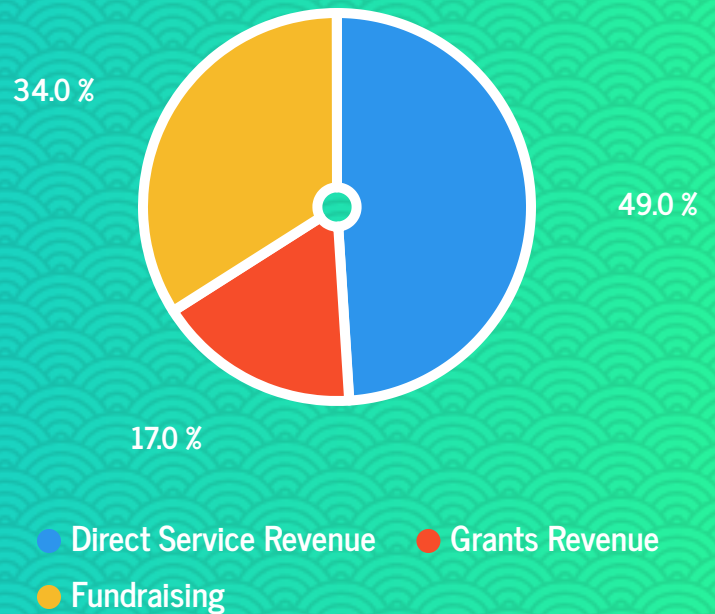

GOING FORWARD

Lomilomi Massage, Lā‘au Lapa‘au, and Acupuncture



In January 2020, our newest provider - Darrell Lapulapu (MAT, LAc) - will begin offering our patients lomilomi massage, la‘āu lapa‘au, and acupuncture services.

Lomilomi Massage: Applying a mixture of different techniques (Hawaiian lomilomi, deep tissue and soft tissue massage, acupressure and Thai massage) to help improve circulation, promote relaxation, relieve stress, and aid with pain management.

Lā‘au Lapa‘au: Using lā‘au traditional herbs of Hawaiian medicine in combination with Chinese formulas and western herbology preparations.

Acupuncture: Assisting with pain management and correcting the imbalance of Qi. These services are provided in conjunction with the rest of your team of healthcare providers at KOKO.

Waimea Nui Project

It is the KOKO Board’s strategic goal to build a new and expanded Clinic at the Waimea Nui Project in 2023!

This year KOKO will further its efforts to plan, design, and raise funds for the eventual building of this facility. The project site is located on 161 acres in the Pu‘ukapu Homestead Farm Lots subdivision in Waimea.
